STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Charity is constituted as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation and was registered on 10 November 2014.

The charity's constitution was signed end of October 2014 and is the document that governs the processes we follow.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The overarching aim of the *Gender and Education Association* is - the advancement of education for the public benefit in gender equality in the field of education with particular reference to curriculum, assessment and examinations and pedagogy and in feminist understandings of, and practices in, gender and education.

This is the broad commitment of the charity, and the way it is delivered on is shaped by the Executive Committee in place at the time, and the kinds of priorities outlined by in-coming Chairs.

During 2015/16, our work focused on the following activities:

- Development of our Executive Committee extending the group further to include more colleagues based outside the UK
- Consolidation of membership data, and embedding processes for promoting new and renewal of membership
- Facilitating the annual Gender & Education conference
- Increasing and maintaining activity on the GEA website
- Launching the GEA Fund

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

- Jessica Ringrose and Claire Maxwell continued as co-Chairs for GEA.
- Executive Committee members include: Fin Cullen, Jessica Gagnon (Social media), Sally Campbell Galman, Kate Hoskins (Treasurer), Sharon Lamb (North America lead, Sexuality Education SIG), Marie-Pierre Moreau (Internationalisation), Andrea Peto, Victoria Showunmi (Equality and Diversity), Vanita Sundaram (Conferences covered by Victoria Showunmi in 2016), Carol Taylor (Membership). In January 2017 Emily Gray (leading on Australia, New Zealand and Pacific region) and Katarina Eriksson Barajas (lead for Scandinavia and SIG approach to GEA).
- Emilie Lawrence is paid to lead on our social media and website development, while Jo Williams is our paid membership secretary.
- Linkoping University hold a very successful international Gender & Education conference in June 2016 and the 2017 conference is being held at Middlesex University, London by Jayne Osgood and colleagues. The theme of the conference in 2017 is: Generative Feminism(s): working across/within/through borders.

- A colleague on the Executive Committee attended the Equinet event in Budapest, May 2016 to discuss intersectionality.
- The GEA website continues to post new materials including: responses to the Brexit vote, reactions to Donald Trump's election, reflections on the 2016 GEA conference, and updates from the Gender Equality Leadership in Schools (GELS) initiative.
- We launched the GEA Fund in June 2016. In September 2016, three initiatives were funded under the first
 year of the scheme which focused on developing national or international networks of feminist scholars,
 practitioners and/or activists to discuss and develop dissemination activities and/or policy interventions in
 areas related to promoting and problematising knowledge on gender and education in different contexts.
 - International Writing with Impact Network for Doctoral Students and Emerging Researchers (I-WIN for Doctoral Students and Emerging Researchers)©. Rachel Handforth & Carol Taylor (Sheffield Hallam).
 - Developing critical feminist sex education in teacher training institutions (Scotland and China).

 - 'Feminist Readings Network' (Réseau Lectures Féministes) [FR network] is a transnational, transdisciplinary and multilingual initiative which provides activists, educators, artists and scholars with a space to explore the question of reading with feminist theory, art, politics and pedagogy. FINANCIAL REVIEW

Membership fees and conference surpluses are the charity's main sources of income. Our main outgoings for 2015/16 were paying our administrator and social media/website lead. We invested in bringing our membership records up-to-date and ensuring we build the necessary processes for managing this.

- Continue to increase membership especially through promotional work outside the UK
- Continue to strengthen our web and social media presence and visibility
- Support an annual Gender & Education conference to promote scholarship and dialogue about pertinent issues within gender and education and facilitate opportunities for networking and professional development
- Promote and invest in a second round of initiatives relevant to gender and education under the GEA Fund.
- Contribute to debates/initiatives relevant to gender and education through the involvement of our Executive Committee or relevant members of the Association in these.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards. The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial period which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit of the charity for that period.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP): Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) as amended by the early adoption of Update Bulletin 1 published on 2nd February 2016 reflecting amendments to FRS102. FRS102 has been applied for the first time for the year ended 31 October 2016. The prior year's accounts were prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (2005).

The Trust constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Trust's ability to continue as a going concern.

The Trustees have taken advantage of the option for early application of the amendments to the SORP outlined in Update Bulletin 1 which does not require charities not meeting the definition of "larger" to present a cash flow statement in accordance with amendments to FRS102.

In preparing these accounts, the Trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charites SORP (as amended by Update Bulletin 1) a restatement of comparative items was needed. No restatements were required.

Donations

Donations received are accounted for on a received basis.

Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Donations and legacies are reported in the Statement of Financial Activities if they are received or due in the financial year.

Expenditure

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Expenditure represents amounts invoiced, including value added tax.

Donations are accounted for on a paid basis.

Taxation

The Charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.
